### The Major in History Education

32 credits, distributed as follows: 4 credits from HIST-130 or 131; 4 credits from HIST-114, HIST-115, or HIST-116; HIST-300; HIST-305 or HIST-306; 4 credits from a 300-level U.S. history course in a period other than the ones taken at the 100-level); 8 credits from 2 of the following geographic areas: Asia, Africa, Latin America, or World history; 4 additional credits from a history course selected in consultation with the advisor; at least 12 credits at the 300 level. See Department of Secondary Education for required supporting courses.

Majors may count up to 8 AP/IB (score of 4 or 5) credits towards the major. These students should choose a 100 or 200-level course from an area outside of their AP/IB subject area.

Completion of this major will fulfill all requirements for the Middle Grades: Social Science major.
