### Value of a liberal arts education

Rooted in her own personal experience, Dr. Shandy is a strong advocate for the value of a liberal arts education positioning graduates to thrive in a complex and ever-changing world. **Dianna Shandy** grew up as a "farm kid from Kansas." With a Pell Grant and a generous scholarship, she made her way to Georgetown University, where her experience as a first-generation college student sparked a deep commitment to removing barriers for others.

Today, as provost, Dr. Shandy is driven by a focused mission: to reduce friction for both students and faculty. Her passion for this work was ignited during a volunteer service year at a Mission School in Namibia's Kalahari Desert. There, she taught adults and saw firsthand the transformative power of supporting teachers.

"That's when I got hooked on the potential amplification of the impact you can have on the world," she recalled. Helping educators, she realized, could magnify her ability to reach students on a much larger scale.

Over time, Dr. Shandy ascended the academic ranks to become a full professor. She loves the classroom, but felt called to work "upstream" at a systems level to support faculty in their roles as scholars, teachers and mentors. At Augustana, she is thrilled to launch the new **Center for Engaged Learning, Teaching, and Scholarship**, designed to nurture faculty and staff excellence and ensure they have the resources and support needed to inspire students.

A key aspect of her leadership is securing competitive national grant funding for engaged learning. She finds it deeply fulfilling to see the college community's passion for making a difference in students' lives recognized by those unfamiliar with the college. In 2024, Augustana was awarded a grant from the Teagle Foundation to fund faculty professional development and revamp the first-year general education curriculum.

In addition to her academic expertise, Dr. Shandy brings a keen interest in the financial side of higher education. She serves in a leadership role on the Finance Committee of the American Anthropological Association, where her insight into financial matters complements her advocacy for faculty and academic excellence.
